Input from our bus drivers: We already have safe fleets and inspections by UHP annually. We also do an additional 20% random testing now. So it is the practice now. Districts compete informally with our inspection results. We have not had problems with equipment failure. Any time a UHP wishes, he may do a road side inspection by law regardless of the scheduled inspections by law. This takes time and if the driver has scheduled pickups another bus must be found and dispatched. That is why we schedule our inspections. Again we have not had problems. We all want to be safe that is the number one goal that we are dedicated to. This bill does not differentiate between scheduled and road side inspections. I would include the word scheduled. 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SB0078	TEACHER PEDAGOGICAL ASSESSMENT	This bill: defines terms; requires the State Board of Education to: establish a teacher pedagogical assessment that is performance based and assesses an individual's pedagogical skills; require an individual to pass a teacher pedagogical assessment to receive or retain a certain license to teach; administer a baseline-year program to implement the use of a teacher pedagogical assessment; and make rules related to a teacher pedagogical assessment; and makes technical and conforming changes.	2) In a world-class system, the highly professional teaching force is well prepared. Through our interactions with teacher education programs in our state colleges and universities we are confident that the prepare pre-service teachers to enter the classroom to teach their first day. Students in these programs are expected to pass this assessment prior to graduation. However, those individuals that come into the profession on alternative licensure pathways, have two years to pass the assessment. We believe every teacher should be prepared to teach their first day. If a teacher pedagogical assessment is to be used to measure compentency, than every individual going into the profession should have to pass it before their first day in the classroom. SB0080	School Funding Amendments	This bill: defines terms; directs the Legislature to annually appropriate an amount equal to one-third of the funds allocated for an increase in the weighted pupil unit value to increase the number of guaranteed local levy increments; directs the State Board of Education to use the appropriation to increase:  • the number of guaranteed local levy increments, giving first priority to guarantee board local levy increments and second priority to guarantee voted local levy increments; and  • the guaranteed amount for each local levy increment per weighted pupil unit after increasing the number of guaranteed local levy increments; directs a local school board to use funds received from the state local levy guarantee for a public education purpose; recodifies and enacts language governing:  • a voted local levy;  • the use of guaranteed local levy increments; and  • a board local levy; and makes technical and conforming amendments.	2) This bill does nothing to address new revenue streams for funding to build a world-class system. SB0102	Utah Student Privacy Act	This bill: provides that a local school board or charter school governing board require a public school to make a list of individuals who are authorized to access education records; requires a local school governing board or charter school governing board to:  • provide training on student privacy laws; and  • require individuals who are authorized to access education records to complete training on student privacy laws and certify to the local school board or the charter school governing board that they have completed the required training and understand student privacy requirements; and prohibits a local school board, charter school governing board, public school, or school employee from sharing an education record with a school employee who is not authorized.	4) This bill supports the larger educational system by protecting student's privacy. Leadership roles offer experienced teachers incentives to remain in the profession, hone and receive rewards for their unique skills, and better support students and colleagues.
